### Handout #9: Apologetic

### The riddle (ch 1-2)

Eternal, sentient man is trapped in, and subservient to, the dusty, mechanistic, inanimate earth. Though his possession, the earth actually owns him, rules him, out-performs him, outlasts him, mocks him as small and insignificant, and merely, cruelly, hauntingly, echoes back to him the emptiness of his life (1:3-11). Man grindingly exhausts his life eking out a living from the world, then it rewards him by swallowing up even his memory. The meager fruit of his life then falls into another's hand unbidden and unappreciated, becoming mere tokens of human rivalry. Rivalry in fact defines man's relationships. Wisdom is disdained, and disparity and inequitable rewards are commonplace. Authority is abused, justice is a sham, and oppression goes unchecked (ch 2-6). Bottom line: wring life as hard as you will, none of the fruits of life fulfill: not *pleasure*, not possessions, and not personhood (ch 2). Thus despair is inevitable, inescapable, even normal (2:23).

### The Riddler (ch 3)

That is, until one accepts God's orchestration of His creation (2:24). For in fact God is behind it all (1:13, 15), He has ordained it, He makes this world exactly the way it is, every gritty facet of life. And He purposely not only made it a hurtful riddle, He has even set it up so we cannot solve the riddle, making it a testimony to Himself that He waits for us to acknowledge, to believe (ch 3).

### The choice (ch 4-8)

Those who fail to acknowledge God choose instead to either check out completely, living meagerly, retractedly (4:1-6), blaming and hating God (5:1-2), or they react with false piety, an overblown caricature of real faith, that is, protractedly (7:15-18), two extremes that belie the truth in the middle (7:18). The faithful will instead cultivates contentment and a relationship with God (5:18-20), choosing to let God be God (8:5-8), and accepting that He knows more than you (8:12, 15-17), and that God's favor or displeasure is not measured in your circumstances (9:1). The faithful person views what God has done as good (8:1) and tries to learn and grow from it (7:1-14), while accepting life's inequities (7:19-29).

### The warning (ch 9-12)

But be forewarned, there is limited opportunity to choose God, to be *approved* by Him, to be declared righteous (9:3-8). Foolishness in word and deed comes from leaving God out of life (ch 10). Wisdom is the right choice not only for eternity, but even for making this present life work for you (ch 11). But choose wisdom while still young (12:1-7), as the alternative is to be subject to this rotten world (12:8). God's word pricks us, and seals us (12:11), but others' words are merely inconclusive, frustrating and wearying (12:12, 1:18). Fear God, love Him, obey Him (12:13). Everyone will give an answer in the end to how they responded to Him (12:14).
